Content

- 3. Character Building Applicants should be just as strong morally as they are mentally; they should have a solid work ethic, be resilient, and be honest.

Resolves concerns without parental intervention

Considering that you direct our Debate Club, I don't think this question will be too difficult. The qualities I will talk about in my essays that are relevant to this point include leadership, initiative, and teamwork.

Example: Recently as you know, our debate team had the opportunity to go to the State Championship. There was a heated argument that ensued during practice between some of the members over the division of labor. Some of the team felt like they were being put aside and that others were being unfairly



privileged with more speaking time and authority. I stepped in during this argument and suggested that each team take an anonymous vote for who the team lead would be. That person would then work in tandem with the other members to make sure that everyone had equal responsibilities. After doing so, the argument was resolved and there were no more issues over speaking time.

Demonstrates integrity, trustworthy, fulfills commitments

Example: As part of the annual bake sale for cancer research, I volunteered to make flyers and put them around town in order to market the event. The organizer was very busy and didn't have time to oversee my work, so I was completely responsible for getting them up on time. I made the flyers early, got approval, and then made sure they were posted two weeks in advance. The bake sale had 50% more attendance than in previous years and I was asked by the organizer to help with future events.

Makes it safe for fellow students to participate in class and share observations

I'll leave this question up to you, as you had a clear line of sight into my behavior within classroom settings and I believe your perspective will be more powerful than any examples that I can offer.

Proactively seeks help when facing a challenge

As I spent a lot of time working through difficult problems in your class, I don't think this prompt should be too difficult either. I've included one example that demonstrates these qualities.

Example: At the beginning of the year, we covered trigonometric functions in your class and, as you're aware, I really struggled with several of the equations. I knew that it would be an important aspect of the AP test so I really wanted to master the concept. In order to proactively improve in this area of weakness, I went to your office hours for lunch for two weeks and worked through problems. I also asked for additional trigonometric homework and completed it after school in my free time. In doing so, I received an A on that chapter's test and—more importantly—mastered trigonometric functions.

Sets and achieves challenging goals

I have spent the last five years playing volleyball on school and club teams. While it started out as a hobby and something to do with my friends, I have since learned to love competing and working to improve my technical skills. Last year, I made it my goal to make the highest-tier team at my volleyball club. Over the summer, I went to the gym early in the morning to do weightlifting and then went to the courts to practice serving. When school started, I dedicated time every weekend toward working on my vertical. Tryouts for the club were about a month ago and I made it onto the team that I wanted.

Based on how you rated the applicant, please share a time you have observed this applicant setting and achieving a challenging goal? Be specific.

Because this question specifically asks you to talk about something that you yourself have observed, I will leave it to you. If you'd like to brainstorm with me, I'd be more than happy to come into your office.
